The Loreto Rumbek mission under the trustee of the Loreto Province in Ireland continues to provide invaluable life changing education and services in South Sudan.



The missions work doesn't stop with its students, an in-school feeding program is extended from students to malnourished children and families outside.

After a lockdown in 2020 the mission was delighted to reopen its doors last year and welcome back over 1,800 students made up of its



female boarders, primary pupils both boys and girls who all walk daily from their homes within a 5k radius of the school and the large number that attend the mission's clinic.

Loreto Rumbek has 15 teaching staff who are all very proud to be associated with the school that was South Sudan's 3rd best performing school in 2021. To continue high standards the mission provides a teaching training program to educate graduates to ensure teaching standards in not only Loreto, but surrounding schools is of excellent standards. Valuable additions to staff last year included Fr Alan and Ann a counselor who can provide invaluable and much needed counselling courses and support to the students. The mission also provides students with a wealth of extra curriculum activities including sports, arts and crafts and drama to name a few all to help students express themselves and deal with the many challenges they face in their daily lives.



ensure students have access to healthcare expanded its services into the local community. Continuing to offer students security and opportunity the mission also offers training and supports to the wider community.

It is of no surprise that Sr Orla Tracey, Director



Francis Teresa Ball was born in 1794 in Dublin, at the age of 9 she went to York to be educated and in 1821 answered a calling to return to Dublin with a vision to provide education to young girls who may not of had such opportunities.

Her journey began in 1821 when the Archbishop of Dublin provided Teresa with a run down house and land in Rathfarnham which she called Loreto House. The name was subsequently used by all future foundations set up when Teresa trained and sent



sisters to set up a flourishing network of schools around Ireland and all 4 corners of the globe. The Loreto order was founded and the sisters became know as the Loreto sisters.

200 years later Teresa Balls amazing vision and dedication to education was celebrated in the global Loreto community. Celebrations were somewhat restricted by the pandemic but many wonderful celebrations still took place. Pre recorded lectures and presentations with student interaction were sent to all Loreto schools, other celebrations to name a few included an online exhibition 'The

Beginning is everything', weekly reflections, prayers, TY projects, tree planting and through music a beautiful Loreto Anthem highlighting Teresa Balls incredible vision and celebrating women's education was produced by Loreto Kilkenny.

Science Department

Term 1 2021/2022

SciFest - after winning the Transition Year SciFest competition last year, current 5th year Anna Holloway entered the Dublin regional final at the end of last year and was the overall winner. In September she was presented with her prizes during an awards ceremony with her year group. Anna went on to represent the school in the SciFest National Final in November, Around the same time we also held our annual Transition Year SciFest competition with the students presenting some very innovative ideas. The winning group looked at the benefits of developing a smart watch for elderly people.

Science Committee -

The Science committee involves a dedicated group of 5th years who organised

activities for Science week in early November including individual class quizzes, crosswords and prizes. They have also assisted with the 1st year Science Club and with the project entry forms for BT Young Scientist.

Science Club started in early October and is held weekly. It is an opportunity for 1st years to experience some practicals within a lab setting. They have done experiments on identifying acids and bases and made their own indicator, flame tests of different elements used in fireworks and looking at the effect of different materials on blocking UV light to see which materials would be best for a space suit.

BT Young Scientist - We had around 12 groups enter into BT Young Scientist this year ranging from 1st - 4th years. 7 groups qualified for the final and spent October to January working to collect

and analyse their data and present their findings under the supervision of their teacher. They had to write a report, create a presentation and make a 3 minute video on their work. All groups did an amazing job and were rewarded with two highly commended prizes and an overall winner of the Junior Social and Behavioural category. The next step is encouraging students to enter SciFest @ College in May to start preparing for next year's BT Young Scientist competition.

6th Years went on their Ecology Trip at the start of the year and had a Chemistry workshop hosted by Trinity.






Art General by Ms.Fynes and Ms.O'Reilly




The genre of this book is murder mystery, so if you're someone like me who'll stay up till midnight reading it, then this book is for you!




A Skinful of Shadows by Frances Hardinge Review by **Amelia-Jane Lawrie** 2T



This is the story of a fierce-hearted girl. Sometimes, when a person dies, their spirit goes looking for somewhere to hide. Some people have space within them, perfect for hiding.

Twelve-year-old Makepeace has learned to defend herself from the ghosts which try to process her in the night, desperate for refuge, but one day a dreadful event causes her to drop her guard. And now the spirit is inside of her. The spirit is wild, brutish and strong, and it may be her only defence when she is sent to live with her father's rich and powerful ancestors. As well as that, she's facing problems outside SLAY. Her boyfriend is constantly asking where she is, what she's doing. Her best friend, who's white, is asking uncomfortable questions about what is considered

cultural appropriation. She also thinks that the person who's sending her threats in the game is someone she knows...

No one really knows about this book which I think is such a pity. It's really an amazing book which is so realistic and easy to read and almost immediately I was engrossed in it. The story is told through the eyes of Kiera but theres also occasional POV's from other black people around the world and how they get treated for being black - consciously and subconsciously. They all play SLAY but I like how they don't end up relating to Kiera i.e. the guy who was the same age as Kiera didn't end up with her in the end.

This book helped me understand the racial injustice which happens in the world, through the little things, like video gaming. The story was so simple but so powerful. Junk Kouture is a fashion competition for teens, where you make outfits and accessories out of recycled materials. The process starts with forming a team and brainstorming ideas on what materials, themes and designs you will create your outfit around. It's important to have a clear plan of action after forming a draft, to help you work as a team. For the competition you need to collect and sample your reclaimed materials and items. Which you can then create and build your outfit over a period of time. Most teams start an instagram account for their outfit to keep their followers updated on their journey. Having unique and strongly themed outfits gives your team a distinctive design.

Our Junk Kouture design "Bubble Vision" was inspired by Old Hollywood ideas of glamour and mystery. We created our skirt and bodice predominantly from bubble wrap to mimic the plasticity of Hollywood. Our second main material was contact lens cases which represent camera lenses and the eyes of the public. We realised that these small plastic cases we use everyday add up and produce a huge amount of waste so we wanted to repurpose them in our dress. As well as these we sewed lace doilies, bottle caps, beads dipped in paint, ribbons and more plastic packaging for the skirt. Mesh from an old tutu was used for the glove and wire with an old pair of tights made up the collar. We learned a lot from the Junk Kouture process and have really enjoyed it.
